## COMMISSIONERS' MEETING April 25, 2022

The Bartholomew County Commissioners met on April 25, 2022, in the Commissioners Chambers of the Governmental Office Building, 440 Third Street, Columbus, Indiana. Commissioners Larry S. Kleinhenz and Tony London, County Auditor Pia O'Connor, Attorney Grant Tucker, and County Administrator Tina Douglas were in attendance. Commissioner Carl H. Lienhoop was unavailable.

Commissioner Tony London opened the meeting.

Commissioner Kleinhenz gave the invocation and led the Pledge of Allegiance.

The first item was the Approval of the Minutes of April 18, 2022. Commissioner Kleinhenz motioned to Approve the Minutes as presented. Commissioner London seconded the motion which passed unanimously.

The next item was the Approval of Claims. Commissioner Kleinhenz motioned to Approve the Claims as presented. Commissioner London seconded the motion which passed unanimously.

The next items were the Weekly Permits Report as read by Commissioner Lienhoop:

The next item was the Weekly Crew Report for County Highway as presented by County Engineer Danny Hollander as follows: patched with dura-patcher and hot box; put up signs; replaced driveway pipes on 900 E & 500 W; crack sealed on Marr Road & 850 S; worked on pipe replacement on Stafford Road for the replacement of Bridge #54; and removed log jams under Lowell Bridge and Southern Crossing. Commissioner Kleinhenz stated that he had looked at the jam at Lowell Bridge which is something they haven't really seen at that location. They tried to use an excavator but had to bring in a crane to get to the Lowell Bridge jam. Commissioner London stated that they had an Orchid in the paper on pothole repairs. Hoosier Energy is working on moving their poles for preparation of Bridge replacements. Commissioner Kleinhenz noted that they are looking for summer help for mowing. They have had more applications this year than they have had in the past. They also had the

ribbon cutting at the new Highway Facility last week. Other counties have been coming in to look at our new Garage as they plan for their future buildings.

Director Gaskill stated that the best mattresses are also the lowest quote. Commissioner Kleinhenz motioned to Award to the low bidder of Indiana Correctional Industries in the amount of \$5,338.00. Commissioner London seconded the motion which passed unanimously.

Deputy Coroner Frederick stated that they have known for years that they needed new radios. They have 2 quotes before them. They are requesting that they purchase from the low bid from ECS in the amount of \$4,957.60. The Sheriff's Department has done research on the radios and they are transitioning to the Kenwood radios. They currently have 1 radio, but they have not replaced those that have been placed out of service. Commissioner Kleinhenz motioned to Accept the low quote from ECS in the amount of \$4,957.60 as presented. Commissioner London seconded the motion which passed unanimously.

The next item was a Decision on the Bartholomew County Jail Mechanical Upgrade as presented by Josh Appling & Charlie Day, of DLZ, (via Zoom) and Maintenance Director Rick Trimpe as follows:

Mr. Appling stated that they had received 2 bids. He had reviewed both bids and recommends the low bid be accepted from Harrell-Fish, Inc. of Bloomington. Director Trimpe is very comfortable with it including the addendums. Commissioner Kleinhenz stated that this will be a very difficult process with the building and the add-on. He is concerned with Change Orders and needs them to watch them very closely. Mr. Appling stated that they will maintain good communication with the contractor. Commissioner London stated that they had originally thought that \$1,200,000 would cover it, but with the prices today, this is where we are. Auditor O'Connor stated that they have budgeted \$1,300,000 out of the American Rescue Plan. With air-borne illnesses that have been highlighted with COVID-19, this is definitely needed. Commissioner Kleinhenz motioned to Award the bid to Harrell-Fish in the amount of \$1,981,968.00 with the 4 addendums. Commissioner London seconded the motion. He then stated the 4 addendums as follows: Addendum #1 – Replace the boilers; Addendum #2 – Provide temporary boiler connections; Addendum #3 – Clean the

# Administration Ductwork; Addendum #4 – Provide HVAC Building Controls by OJS Building Systems. The vote was called for and passed unanimously.

Commissioner Kleinhenz stated that they are averaging 100 tons of cardboard being diverted from the landfill. He believes that volume wise, cardboard takes up 6 times the amount as trash.

improved it. Commissioner London agreed.

Under miscellaneous, Chris Rutan stated that they had a neighborhood situation where a dog

ran out of a car and was hit. The family was lacking funds for the veterinarian services that were

needed. He wanted to make certain that everyone knew there are 2 funds that are ran through the

Humane Society to assist with bills. One is the Nala Fund (for dogs only) and can pay a one-time

amount of up to \$300 while the other is the Ginger & Friends Fund that can also assist. If neither of

these can assist, there is a Thor's Emergency Fund that may be able to provide financial assistance.
